Ten families that include over 30 children have been housed the whole month of December because of donations from ELCA congregations and individuals. Some of the families will be able to stay in this housing through January. Why? Because the appeal asked for \$10,000 but nearly \$20,000 was received. Thanks be to God! Well over 100 people representing at least 25 of our congregations contributed to this appeal.

For the LORD your God is God of gods and Lord of lords, the great God, mighty and awesome, who is not partial and takes no bribe, who executes justice for the orphan and the widow, and who loves the strangers, providing them food and clothing. Deuteronomy 10:17-18) NRSV

Susan Johnson, National Bishop for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada, told us at our annual Bishops' Academy that the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) is now the second largest provider of services to refugees in the world. Only the International Red Cross is serving more refugees than LWF. This is yet another example of how Lutherans are working behind the scenes to bring God's welcome and compassion to those in need.

When you hear the news reports of the refugee camps serving the people of Somalia in Kenya and Ethiopia, it is LWF who is in charge of maintaining those camps. It is Lutherans from around the world coming together to respond in ways that will change lives.

I know the jokes about shy, humble Lutherans. I know that we are not about bringing attention to ourselves when we are doing God's work. I also know that we are too often unaware of what our dollars given to the hunger appeal or our quilts given to Lutheran World Relief (LWR) do when they leave our services of blessing. These gifts are making a difference.

The concerns about the institutionalization of the church are appropriate and should be heard. On the other hand it is because the church has organized and is a large institution that we are able to take on these overwhelming responsibilities. Your mission partnership support provides

the staff for this work. Your gift to the hunger appeal provides the aid that can be shared. This effort takes all we can give and more. The fact is that it is God at work.

I am grateful to God that we have the ability to respond to these "strangers" that God loves. At times the alphabet soup of institutional responses can confuse and overwhelm us. LWF, LWR and LDR each has a role to play in local and international efforts to do what God has commanded that we do. The ELCA is involved in these and other organizations like Church World Service. We are at work in the whole world even as we gather in our local congregations.

We will continue to advocate for a world in which refugees are not a reality. Until that day when the reign of God is complete, we will respond to those who are without homes or hope. Their hope is in God. Through LWF you are responding as the people of God. Thanks be to God.

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## Two Years Later

Two years ago the news was devastating; the images, indelible. The 7.0 magnitude earthquake that struck the island nation of Haiti the afternoon of January 12, 2010, the worst in more than 200 years, killed approximately 316,000 people, brought countless buildings to the ground in a matter of seconds, and forever changed the lives of millions.

Since 1997, through partner organizations, Lutheran World Relief (LWR) has been working in Haiti because the majority of Haitians faced decades of problems, most of which begin and end in extreme poverty. Poor health and malnutrition, an utter lack of work opportunities, government corruption and the devastation of Haiti's natural resources have left few options

Following the earthquake, LWR delivered immediate relief with water, food and resources like tarps, quilts, personal care kits and school kits; and supporting cash-for-work programs, latrine-building for sanitation, and basic medical monitoring and treatment training in communities of displaced people.

Through our gifts LWR is committed to seeing Haiti through long-term rehabilitation:

- ❑ **Agriculture**—Relieving hunger and malnutrition through agriculture programs that include setting up seed banks and providing technical training for farmers and supporting farmer associations that will give farmers better bargaining power for buying seeds and equipment and selling crops.
- ❑ **Water**—Building and distributing water filters to give people access to clean drinking water, and training locals how to maintain them.
- ❑ **Health and Livelihoods**--Getting artisans back to work and increasing their incomes through business training and helping them access credit.

## Our Chance For Savings

Congratulations! In 2011 more than 65 percent of eligible ELCA-primary plan members and spouses in our synod took the Mayo Health Assessment.

With that news your congregation and the synod saved two percent on medical costs: A total of \$33,000 in savings.

Can this synod reach, or surpass, that goal in 2012?

The Mayo Clinic Health Assessment is confidential and takes about 15 minutes to complete. If you have recent lab results, great. If not, you can always fill in those numbers later.

The portal to take the assessment will open on January 1, 2012, at [www.elcaforwellness.org](http://www.elcaforwellness.org). Find instructions in the *Understand My Benefits* section at [www.elcabop.org](http://www.elcabop.org). Once you complete the assessment you will earn \$150 in your personal wellness account to offset out-of-pocket medical expenses.

Reminder: the ELCA *Board of Pension* is changing its name to *Portico Benefit Services*. This will take place during the next 12 to 18 months.

## Here 'n There

- **Where did Quilts and Kits to Lutheran World Relief go in 2011?** To 26 countries around the world. Thanks to the compassion and generosity of members we were able to send: 355,786 quilts; 166,427 school kits; 311,763 personal care kits; 72610 baby care kits; and 21,234 fabric kits.
- In 2011 many **Everett congregations** supported the Trinity Aid Bank. Members from Trinity, Central, Trinity Episcopal, First Covenant and Trinity Lutheran College. Members at Central in Everett raised more than \$9413 for their food basket mission.
- Members at **Bethany in Seattle** donated 650 lbs of food and household items in 2011 to the University Food Bank.
- In December members at **Our Savior's in Everett** donated enough food to fill more than 100 baskets and wrapped almost 400 presents for those in need in their community.
- In Kirkland, members at **Holy Spirit** packed 62 baskets of food for their Thanksgiving Food Baskets for Kirkland Interfaith Transitions in Housing. And members were not done. They also collected \$2812 which allowed additional purchases to be made for the baskets. And, Thrivent matched their efforts with \$800.
- The Annual Trinity Lutheran Bazaar at **Trinity in Freeland** raised more than \$12,000 for local charities.
- Members at **First in Mount Vernon** donated more than 1300 lbs for the charity Neighbors in Need.
- **January Cold Weather Shelters:** Trinity in Lynnwood hosted 155 people over six nights; Kent Lutheran in Kent hosted 130 people (including Pastor Jane Prestbye) over seven nights, Faith in Bellingham hosted 70 people over three nights, and Our Saviour's in Arlington hosted six people over two nights.
