Forum Titles, Facilitators & Descriptions

Accompanying Our Neighbors without Stable Homes

Presenters: Rev. Kristy Daniels (Church of Steadfast Love and Compass Housing Alliance); Rev. Verlon Brown (Central/Seattle, formerly with REACH working on the streets of Seattle with those struggling with alcoholism); and Rev. Paul Benz (Street Minister with Operation Nightwatch and Harborview Medical Center Chaplain)

Description: Live + Love + Advocate. We will share information and lead a discussion on recognizing, accompanying, and advocating for our neighbors who are experiencing homelessness or housing insecurity. **Session: #2 both Saturdays**

Best Financial Practices

Description: This interactive forum is geared toward congregational treasurers, financial secretaries, and others who work with church finances. Changing Currents of Faith Formation

Description: We are noticing that leaders are faithfully struggling to make sense of what it means to be church in today's rapidly changing world. We spend time and energy experimenting with new methods of being the church while only applying them to outdated imaginations more rooted to expectations of past models for success than the realistic challenges of our time. Without understanding the changing currents of faith formation, how faith and belief itself has become effected by the current cultural backdrop, we will only continue to spin our wheels in perpetual motion like a one-winged duck, and without any directional sense that resembles faith in Christ. Come and explore this shift, why this work seems so strange for us in today's pluralistic context, and what kinds of things we might begin to do to mitigate our headaches, and to replace them with practices of trust and hope. **Session: #3 both Saturdays**

Coach Northwest Story Sharing

uncover and utilize your strengths and insights to accomplish your goals. Lutheran Disaster Response

Description: This presentation will explore the past, present, and future of Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR). Many are familiar with LDR's work on behalf of those impacted by earthquake, landslide, and flooding. Climate change has affected the increase and the severity of disasters in North America and the world. In response, LDR is redefining their mission. LDR continues to provide relief in the wake of disaster, but they are also turning their attention to working for resilient communities. This bifurcation of missions is leading LDR in new opportunities to react and to prepare communities for natural and man-made disasters. Reconciling in Christ - What it is and what comes AFTER your community becomes RIC

Description: This forum will review what it means to become a Reconciling in Christ (RIC) community, and then dive more deeply into the answer to the question "so NOW what?!" It's imperative that we listen and respond to the diverse needs of all those we seek to welcome. As communities that declare an inclusive welcome to LGBTQIA+ siblings, we will consider the next steps beyond a welcome statement and rainbow flag. As youth are more and more aware of gender diversity and expansiveness, how do ministries with youth programs handle overnight trips? What are neo pronouns and how do we practice using new words? If everyone knows everyone else, why are nametags with pronouns important? What about bathrooms? Relating with Our Indigenous Neighbors

Description: Every church in our synod is on land that was and is inhabited by Indigenous tribes, and yet most churches do not have any relationship with their Indigenous neighbors. *Why* is it important to be in relationship? What has hindered relationship? What does a congregation need to know before making connection, and how might relationship happen? Taking Care of Business: Make Running Meetings Your Superpower

Underground Ministries: Local Resurrection and Reentry Communities

Presenters: Chris Hoke (Founder and Executive Director of Underground Ministries) and Alvin Shim (Director of Operations, Underground Ministries)

Description: There are roughly the same amount of incarcerated people as there are churches in Washington State. Every church has exactly what just one person needs as they prepare to exit prison: trusting friendship, pre-release housing searches, rides to appointments, job connections, community. Without a goal to fix or solve or convert each other, One Parish One Prisoner teams gather instead to approach the tombs of the underground: mass incarceration, addiction, trauma, neglect, violence, isolation, fear, and shame—together, in their own neighborhoods. What does new life look like? One Parish One Prisoner teams are equipped monthly to write letters, explore these conversations together, to make room in their community, and take on this journey of trust and embrace. We have 40 paired teams in Washington State, six Lutheran churches, and we need approximately 60 more churches to practice this resurrection with a new friend experiencing incarceration.
